It was a delightful morning filled with exploration and discovery. By the end of our adventure, although tired from all the walking, the children returned with hearts full of new-found knowledge and memories.

JOHN EGGING TRUST (J.E.T)

So far, my personal experiences with JET have been nothing short of wonderful. To describe it simply, I only began JET this year (early 2024) and since then. JET has considerately and kindly provided us all (including me) with lessons on topics such as finances, jobs within mechanical engineering (specifically aircraft and planes), household bills and expenses (linking back to topics of finance) and team-working and team-building skills. We have also looked at healthy leadership roles, creativity development and equal roles and jobs in careers and so forth.

Since the start of the programme, I have done many different lessons covering different topics. During our first lesson, we had to build a form of transportation to carry along different material objects. This exercise involved the necessities of teamwork, individual contributions and expressions of ideas/creativity. This will help in the future as it shows the team the importance of communication skills, working together and dependency, as well as being imaginative, building connections and bonds, and discovering new ways to solve problems. During my time at JET, I have also seen aeroplanes (up close), learnt about their different features and functions, and how they can benefit and guide future pilots, mechanics etc (more points on this later). I have also learnt, through a mentor speech last month, how giving up won't solve anything, and if you continue pushing your goals and dreams, nine times out of 10 you will face success. In my most recent session, we learnt about managing finances, debts/loans and bills (as previously mentioned.) In this session, too, we learnt about the importance of keeping positive credit scores, avoiding overdrafts and loans and the reasons for multiple types of bill, some examples being council tax, utilities and TV licences.

It's safe to say, JET has been an entertaining and enlightening experience. My favourite and most enjoyable part was getting to be adjacent to real aeroplanes that you only usually see from so many kilometres below (unless, of course, they're toy ones from B&M). It was fun to see their different parts, briefly

how they are made and learn about their capability (speed, capacity etc).

I certainly believe this is a brilliant opportunity to come by, and I for one am so glad I've been given a chance to take part in the engaging and fascinating tasks that JET has to offer.


